Another area for enhancement is the discussion of political change and the observed regression in democratization. Including an analysis of autocratization, especially within electoral processes, would strengthen the critique. Furthermore, to comprehend the high approval ratings among the national populace, it would be insightful to investigate the relationship between Modi and the proprietors of major media outlets in India.

Despite these areas for improvement, Rai's article is highly engaging and well-structured. It is a valuable resource for those interested in Indian national politics and the broader themes of democratization and democratic regression.

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
