Some sections discussing theoretical concepts (e.g., Lacan's symbolic order) are dense and may benefit from further clarification or examples to aid comprehension. For example, when discussing Lacan's symbolic order, include examples of how this operates in contemporary psychiatric practices.

Overall, your article presents a compelling argument that challenges traditional views on mental health and calls for a reevaluation of how we perceive and treat individuals deemed "mad." Thank you for your important work in this area.
